Grand Rapids, Feb. 3 .- (Special) -Muskegon Junior College lost its second game of the season to Grand Rapids Junior College here last night after a spectacular ex-hibition of basketball featured by the playing of Norman McDonald of the Muskegon team, and Formsma of the local aggregation. final score was 42 to 31 for the local squad, but that score doesn't indicate the closeness of the game.

The race was a nip and tuck affair, with the home team adding the odd two points at intervals, to pile up and protect a lead that was threatened several times by the scoring trio of the visitors, yet was never dispelled. The score deadlocked at four each, then the local

team pulled away.
At half time Muskegon had climbed back to an 18-14 score, with Grand Rapids leading. Shortly after the second half opened, Formsma, who scored 20 points during the game, caged a field goal, and that lead was never shaken. The Muskegon troup, howthroughout the game, with speciacular shots from all angles,

Captain McDonald scored 14 of his team's points, while Hathaway added ten and Hohenstein seven. But the difference in the score was made up by the local guards. Muskegon's guards could not score. The five man combination proved better than the three man scoring machine.

Captain McDonald also missed several shots which ordinarily would have gone through the hoop. Had he made all of his short tries, the score would have been closer. with a chance for a Muskegon victory. The height advantage of the local team also was a big factor in the victory.

The Muskegon Jaysees meet Flint on the Central Campus gym floor in a game that is all-important to Coach M. R. Ewing's cagers. Muske-

gon Y.M.C.A. plays Ann Arbor Y at the local Y gymnasium.

Muskegon Junior College last year won just three games, its first year of competition. This year the team has won five, and has lost only to the superb Grand Rapids Junior College team, a quintet that has so far gone through the season undefeated, and a perusal of its schedule holds little hope for its defeat.

Thus the game here tenight is for second place in the Junior College league. Muskegon and Flint are tied at present, with Muskegon boasting one victory over the Flint cagers so far. The game is slated to start at \$130 p. m. A preliminary will bring together the Eshleman Drugs of Grand Rapids, Western Michigan class C A. A. U. champions of 1927, and the Muskegon Highlanders, class B champions of the same tournament. The first game starts at 7:30 p. m.
