Highland Park Coach Takes Team From Floor With Ewings in Lead

Facing their third defeat in three days, Highland Park Junior college, on the low end of a 38 to 25 score, and with Muskegon Junior college strutting ahead farther with each field goal that swished through the hoops, Saturday night walked off the floor at the Central Campus glmnasium, while the team's coach vainly protested against what he termed unfair decisions by Referee Brooks, assist-ant coach under C. Leo Redmond at Muskegon High.

The action of the Highland Park coach in taking his boys off the floor appeared unsportsmanlike. for, from the spectators' point of view, it was the losing Park team which was getting rough as it saw the game and a possible tie for second place in the state league going glimmering. The Parkers played a rough game, and as they outweighed and outranged the Muskegon team, closer calling of fouls would not have affected the local team, but rather might have chased several of the visitors to the showers early in the first half,

Brooks has a reputation as a fair and competent official. He had handled the game in good style until its suddenstermination, which will go down as a 2 to 0 vic-tory for Muskegon, despite the 36 to 25 margin held when the tilt broke up in a row.

When the Highland Park coach rushed out on the floor and took his men off, Brooks rightly declared a forfeit, and stuck to his decision despite the pleas of Coach M. R. Ewing, who would have arranged the remainder of the battle to please the spectators, a fair

crowd being present.
Although Highland Park showed flashes of form, Muskegon Junior held the lead most of the way. There seemed little doubt as to the outcome at any time, with Hohenstein and Captain Norman Mc-Donald in form and shooting baskets from all angles. Muskegon led 20 to 12 at haif time.

After the half, Highland Park spurted, and came within two time. Then the local Jaysees got back into form, and the battle had become a rout when the Highland Park coach evidently figured discretion to be the better part of valor, and decided to forfeit the game.
