

# Y.M.C.A. JUNIOR COLLEGE QUINTETS TO MEET AT

## CAMPUS GYM TONIGHT

### FAST GAME EXPECTED IN 1ST ANNUAL GAME BETWEEN FIVES

*Records for Season Exactly Same; Each Has Won Nine and Lost Three Contests; Highlander Midgets, Pathfinders to Clash in Preliminary at 7 O'clock.*

The last basketball game of the season for Muskegon fans is scheduled tonight, with Muskegon Y.M.C.A. and Junior College fives meeting in a much-discussed contest, that will decide the senior championship of the city, for representative teams at least, at the Central Campus gymnasium. The game is slated to start at 8 p. m. It will be the first annual battle between the two organizations, and will start a rivalry which is expected to become more or less of a traditional nature.

A large crowd of fans is expected to gather to watch the contest. Each team has outstanding performers, and their records are the same, with each team winning nine and losing three games during the season.

McCall and DeHorn at guards give Muskegon Y an edge in that department over Lambert and Rohwedder, with Herman Fischer, jumping center, dropping back to standard guard when the tipoff is completed.

The fans who attend the Central Campus contest, should see a fast, well played game when the Highlander Midgets and Pathfinders clash. The Midgets last year won Western Michigan A. A. U. honors at Grand Rapids. This year the Pathfinders have reached class C finals, and will oppose the Grand Haven Coca-Colas in the finals tomorrow night. Tonight's prelim starts at 7 p. m.

Muskegon Junior College has won two games from Highland Park, Flint and Port Huron Junior Colleges, and Hope College freshmen, besides an even break with Ferris Institute, winning here and dropping a game in two overtimes at Big Rapids. The team lost to Grand Rapids Junior twice and the Ferris, for a record of nine games won and three lost.

Muskegon Y has defeated Benton Harbor, Grand Rapids and Ann Arbor Y teams twice each, Kalamazoo Y once, Grand Rapids Immanuel Presbyterians and American Seaters of Grand Rapids. The team lost twice to Grand Rapids Boters and once to Kalamazoo Y, for a record of nine games won and three lost.

A comparison of the teams gives the college five a commanding lead at center, with Captain McDonald conceded the best of Muskegon centers this year. The forwards of the Y team have a slight edge individually, with Hathaway and Hohenstein of the College scoring as often as Veysey, Vanderplow and Bohn through better team play.

## MUSKEGON Y QUINTET DEFEATS JUNIOR COLLEGE FIVE 47-40

*Individual Brilliance of Veysey, McCall Responsible for Margin; Latter Scores 24 Points in Game; Hohenstein Hathaway Lead Collegiate Scorers.*

Muskegon Y.M.C.A. eaglers won the first annual basketball game from Muskegon Junior College last night after a sensational game at the Central Campus gymnasium, 47 to 40.

The team play of the Jaysees threatened all of the way through to down the superior individual prowess of the Y tossers, but with Paul Veysey and Bill McCall going "hot," the association quintet finally pulled away to a lead that cinched the game. The Jaysees matched point for point with their more experienced rivals the entire game, with McCall's 24 points the chief reason for the defeat.

The score at the end of the first half was 26 to 24 in favor of the Y team, with Hathaway performing great shooting for the J. C. squad. Hathaway made eight points in that first half, while Hohenstein contributed six, McDonald and Rohwedder four each, and Lambert two. Veysey made ten points for the Y in the first half and was tied by McCall who contributed ten also.

McCall Goes Right On.

In the second half Veysey was practically stopped, adding one more field goal. Vanderplow, who substituted for him, added another, while Fischer made a free throw and DeHorn a field basket, for seven points. The remainder of the burden fell on the shoulders of McCall, who broke loose for five more field goals, and when the Jaysees attempted to stop him, fouls were called. McCall made them all, sinking four free throws during the half to bring his total to 14 for the period and 24 in all.

The Jaysee team was also checked considerably in its scoring, when the second half developed into a close guarding affair, with the teams disinclined to take chances with their offensives. Each had earned considerable respect for its opponent during that hectic first half.

Jaysees Surprise Fans.

The game was a surprise for many fans who attended it. The Y team was expected to run away with the verdict, stars being compared to give the association team a real margin. But the team play of the J. C. five was exceptional, and accounted for the closeness of the game. Coach Ewing has developed a fine team from the material available at the Junior Col-
