A favorable report will be made to the North Central Association of Secondary schools and colleges and to the Muskegon Board of Education, by Examiner George R. Moon of Chicago, who spent the early part of this week in an inspection of the Junior college.

"We are not in a position to say anything definitely until Mr. Moon's written report comes back, but his conversation on the subject was very gratifying to us. He seemed well pleased," Superintendent of Schools M. W. Longman said today.

The North Central association will meet in Chicago March 12, 13, 14 and 15 to pass on the accrediting of Junior colleges. Principal John A. Craig is a member of the association commission on institutions of higher education, which will pass on the Muskegon Junior college. Mr. Craig has been asked to be in Chicago Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of next week.

BOOKS TRANSFERRED FOR JUNIOR COLLEGE LIBRARY

Completion of details connected with the establishment of the new branch library at Junior College is being made this week under the direction of C. Tefft Hewitt, Hackley Public Library librarian.

JUNIOR COLLEGE ON ACCREDITED LIST

Muskegon Institution One of Few Accepted by North Central Ass'n.

Muskegon Junior college was one of just four of the 12 which made application to the North Central association of Schools and Colleges at its meeting last week for rating, to be placed on the accredited list of the association, Principal John A. Craig of senior high school, a member of the association, said today.

Low rating in one or more of the requirements upon which the rating is based, caused the rejection of eight colleges which made application. Points most stressed in rating are laboratory and library equipment, condition and standard, general equipment, and science of classes.

The North Central association now embraces 20 states, extending from Ohio to Montana and from Minnesota to Arizona. It is the largest of five similar organizations in this country.

The association division on colleges has determined upon a new policy of refusing to accredit teachers' training schools, such as normal schools, except those which provide a regular four year course for which a Bachelor of Arts degree may be given. Ypsilanti and Western State normals have qualified under this rule. Marquette and Mt. Pleasant normals have qualified for one year but must be inspected again at the end of a year.

"The association is doing a great work in maintaining the high standard of scholarship, and in raising that standard, in schools of the district," Mr. Craig said.

Muskegon High school has been on the accredited list of the association for a number of years.
