MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



As I reflect on the 2021-2022 school year, I feel a deep sense of gratitude for every person who helps make Muskegon Community College (MCC) a special place for our students. I am especially thankful to our Board of Trustees for their leadership and commitment, and to retired President Dr. Dale Nesbary. Dr. Nesbary's vision and intense focus over the past 13 years have been instrumental to MCC's success.

Topping the list of successes this past year are the 608 students who graduated with 651 degrees, diplomas, and certificates; the public recognition of staff and faculty for their exceptional work; and the

advancement of diversity, equity, and inclusion through a new Chief Diversity Officer position. In addition, MCC completed a nation-wide search for a college president, unveiled a grant-funded Consumers Energy K-12 STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) Lab; served as a national COVID-19 Vaccine Champion with 258 free vaccines administered on campus; and celebrated the Jayhawk's first wrestling national championship in 21 years.

It was also an important year for our strategic plan. In December 2021, MCC concluded its 2017-2021 Strategic Plan six months ahead of schedule with 94 objectives successfully completed. In March of 2022, the Board of Trustees endorsed our new "2022-2026 Strategic Plan: Aspiring to Be the Best" with three newly identified priorities: access, equity, and excellence. The plan was developed with input from our students, employees, partners in business and industry, education, nonprofits, government, and the greater community.

I must admit, being selected as the eleventh president of Muskegon Community College is, for me, the most important thing that happened in 2021-2022! It is my honor and privilege to serve in this role. My unwavering focus is that our students are safe, supported, and have the services they need to overcome any barrier to learning. When prospective students wonder if they can be successful at MCC, together all of us can say with confidence, "Of course, you can!"



STRATEGIC PLAN PRIORITY 1 ACCESS

MCC will expand outreach efforts and be a visible and recognized leader

GOALS

- 1. Increase awareness of MCC
- 2. Meet annual enrollment goals while expanding opportunities for underrepresented populations
- 3. Increase community engagement

2021-2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- To help keep higher education affordable, there was no tuition rate increase for 2021-2022 and MCC offered the lowest tuition rate in Muskegon, Ottawa, and Newaygo Counties
- The Free Application for Federal Student Aid **(FAFSA)** completion rate was increased to 85%, ensuring more students would be eligible for financial aid (up from 74.5% the previous year)
- 6,919 prospective students **responded to online advertising** by completing an enrollment application, exceeded the annual marketing goal by 19.4%
- 353 students from 21 high schools, plus home-schooled students, participated in **Senior Visit Days**
- 10,903 people **requested information** from Enrollment Services, exceeding our new student inquiry goal by 7.5%
- 1,371 students participated in the **Michigan Reconnect Program**, which covers tuition costs for state residents age 25 or older
- 5,128 students, including 1,785 new students, enrolled during the 2021-2022 academic year
- MCC awarded **\$2,290,850 to 3,694 students** through the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund (HEERF) authorized by the American Rescue Plan (ARP)
- MCC's Workforce Development engaged with 68 companies to fulfill workforce training needs
- 729 contributions, totaling \$451,720.14, were made to the **Foundation for MCC** to fund scholarships and other initiatives to further MCC's mission
- 2,383 students received some form of financial aid
- Students had access to IIO laptops and 60 Wi-Fi hot spot devices to support remote-learning
- 2,354 people provided input for MCC's new **strategic plan**, including 150 students, community stakeholders, and employees serving on five planning committees



RETENTION AND RECRUITMENT

New Microsite

In 2022, the Admissions, Students Services, and Marketing and Communications departments collaborated to launch a microsite to attract new students and promote services for current students. The microsite features short videos and is linked on the home page of www.muskegoncc.edu and www.mccyoucan.org. It provides an online, on-demand video viewbook hub where students can select from playlists and build their own playlists.

Jayhawk Hub

The Jayhawk Hub provides a system of wrap-around support for students' basic needs including food and transportation. Students enjoy free coffee and snacks while connecting face-to-face with caring MCC staff. Community members from a variety of health and human service agencies offer resources and a listening ear.

The John G. "Jack" Thompson Fund

The John G. "Jack" Thompson fund, an endowed fund supports student recruitment efforts at MCC. The purpose of the John G. Thompson Academic Pathways Recruitment Series is to encourage prospective students (especially underrepresented groups) to come to MCC for an education, special learning programs or events. Jack Thompson served as president of MCC from 1976 to 1986. Sadly, Mr. Thompson passed away in 2013. Through their fund, established shortly after his retirement in 1986 by Mr. Thompson along with his wife, Suzi Norbeck, his commitment to students and love for the college live on.

2021-2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- The Office of Diversity, Equity and Inclusion provided **training** sessions related to implicit bias and creating inclusive cultures for 11 entities with more than 900 total participants
- Over 500 people attended the **Unity Breakfast**, an annual event celebrating the legacy of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.
- Enrollment Services cultivated **relationships** with the WOW Academy, Muskegon Heights High School, Covenant Academy, and other organizations to increase enrollment of students of color
- The Office of Human Resources completed the six-month HireReach Program with **Talent First**, updated hiring practices to mitigate unconscious bias, and improve recruitment materials to better showcase the diversity of MCC's leadership and board to increase diversity of employment applicants
- We outlined parameters for the next **assessment of facilities** in Muskegon, Ottawa, and Newaygo Counties, placing an emphasis on improving access
- A **signage assessment** project was completed, which helps ensure that students can navigate our main campus and other locations in Muskegon, Ottawa, and Newaygo Counties
- We offered 7 activities to support **student well-being**, including COVID-19 vaccinations, mental health services, and free food from the Jayhawk Pantry
- The Jayhawk Hub was utilized over 942 times by students to support them with food and other services that address housing insecurity, mental health, and other basic needs
- **Tutoring Services** provided 941 free tutoring sessions for students
- The Care Team responded to 1,094 Care Reports and completed 682 support sessions with students

2021-2022 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

- 607 students earned a **diploma** or **certificate**, with 651 **credentials** conferred
- In conjunction with our strategic planning process, we conducted a comprehensive **Community Needs Assessment** to ensure that MCC provides the programs and courses needed to meet student and community needs (available at www.muskegoncc.edu/aspiring/#needs)
- 31% of students attending in 2021-2022 achieved a grade point average (GPA) of 3.5-4.0, placing them on the President's List, Dean's List, or the **Academic Honors List**
- 44 **Jayhawk student athletes** achieved a GPA of 3.6 or better, earning them an NJCAA Academic Student-Athlete Award
- Academic Affairs completed the evaluation of 14 academic disciplines and occupational programs to ensure they meet **learning effectiveness** guidelines
- 82% of our 39 departments achieved or exceeded their annual **key performance indicators** in support of institutional goals
- The Muskegon Community College 2017-2022 Strategic Plan: Successful Students, Successful Communities, concluded six months ahead of schedule with **94 objectives successfully completed**
- The Office of Information Technology exceeded its **response time** and request fulfillment goals
- We successfully completed the 2021-2022 financial year **on budget** and with no audit findings
- Study and career options were expanded with the addition of three **new programs**: Certified Personal Trainer, Medical Assistant Registered Apprenticeship, and Surgical Technology
- Career and Transfer Services hosted 11 online events to support **successful transfers** to 4-year institutions
- The 2022-2026 Strategic Plan, Aspiring to be the Best, was launched with ten goals focusing on access, equity, and excellence, all aiming to position Muskegon Community College as a **student success leader**



2022 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNI AWARD

Asaline Scott, whose long career in banking has been matched by her generous community advocacy, received the Muskegon Community College 2022 **Distinguished Alumni Award**. After graduating from Muskegon Heights High School, Asaline declined a scholarship to the University of Michigan to attend MCC as a working, non-traditional student while she and her late husband, John Arthur Scott, raised their family.

Graduating Magna Cum Laude at every stop along her academic ascent, Asaline earned an Associate Degree from MCC in 1990, a Bachelor of Arts from Grand Valley State University's Seidman College of Business in 1994, and an MBA in Organizational Change and Diversity, Equity & Inclusion from Western Michigan University's Haworth College of Business in 2000, when she graduated with three of her children. At GVSU, Asaline received the Outstanding Senior in Finance Award.

2022 ALUMNI ACHIEVMENT AWARD

Samuel Callen '08, earned the 2022 Muskegon Community College Alumni Achievement Award. Samuel is the Vice President of Strategy for Worldpay by FIS, the world's leading global payments provider. Born and raised in Kent City, MI, Samuel attended MCC prior to transferring to Ferris State University, where he earned a Bachelor of Business Administration degree, and was an award-winning member of the school's Speech and Debate

After Ferris State, he moved to Alaska to serve in the AmeriCorps VISTA program, with a specific focus on rural Alaskan economic development as a means of poverty alleviation. Through his placement at the University of Alaska, Samuel led the growth and scale-up of two non-profit initiatives focused on spurring rural entrepreneurship. From there, he was promoted first to a Strategy Consultant, and then to the Associate Director of Strategy for the University of Alaska Center for Economic Development.
